Fresh Water, Sovereignty and Security: What British Columbians Think

Results of the 2026 Watershed Security survey, with tracking to 2018 · Prepared by McAllister Opinion Research for the BC Watershed Security Coalition · September 2026

1. Political Context

The survey was in the field August 27 to September 1, 2026.

The following events, in the news before and since, form the context in which the results are being released. None of these were mentioned to respondents.

Date	Event
Aug 22, 2026	United States imposes 50% tariffs on roughly \$20 billion of Canadian goods after trade talks collapse.
Aug 27	U.S. President signs an executive order directing the federal government to rename Lake Ontario “Lake America.”
Aug 29	Ontario Premier Doug Ford unveils a “Lake Ontario — Now and Always” billboard near the border; Prime Minister Carney: “this lake is called Lake Ontario — today and forever.”
Sept 1	Carney: “Canada’s a sovereign state. We will strike free trade deals with the countries we wish.”
Sept 7	President posts a map on Truth Social depicting Canada, Mexico, Greenland and others under the U.S. flag.
Sept 8	Canada’s retaliatory tariffs on more than 700 U.S. goods take effect.
Since Mar 2025	Columbia River Treaty modernisation talks paused by the U.S. administration; not resumed as of this writing. The treaty governs flood control and power on the B.C.–U.S. Columbia system.
Sept 14–18	Union of BC Municipalities convention, Victoria. Resolutions EB22 (Lake Country: modernise industrial water rates) and EB23 (Sunshine Coast RD: funded local watershed boards) on the floor.
Nov 15	Statutory deadline for the Legislature’s Finance Committee to report Budget 2027 recommendations.

How British Columbians see the players. In the same survey, impressions of U.S. President Donald Trump are 13% positive and 71% negative (65% very negative). Prime Minister Mark Carney: 48% positive / 35% negative. Premier David Eby: 30% / 44%. BC Conservative Leader Kerry-Lynne Findlay: 27% / 39%. Alberta Premier Danielle Smith: 26% / 45%.

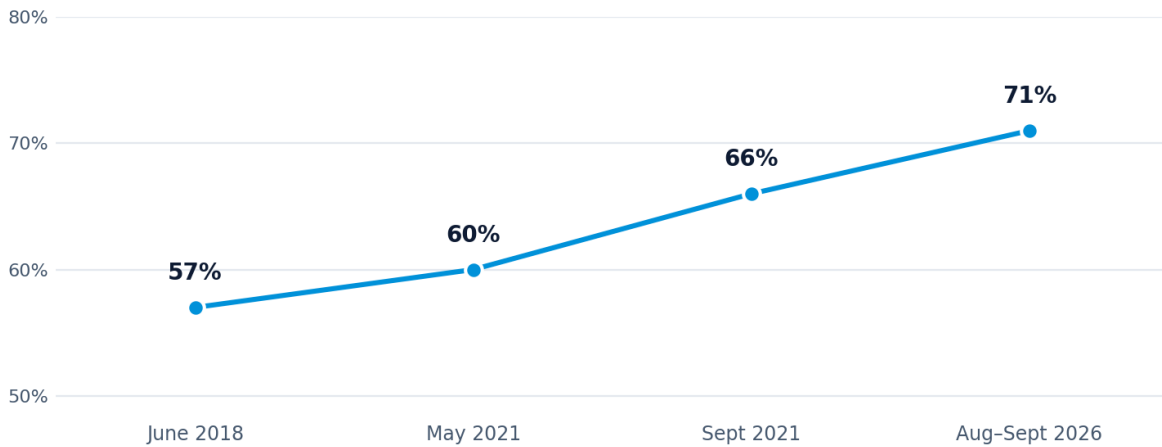

Reading the table. Water-as-security is the one statement on which the three party bases converge within eight points. The “standards are the price of doing business” statement is endorsed by a majority of all party supporters. Together these describe an electorate that wants a strong province and expects strong rules — a mandate that belongs to no single party.

5. Concern at home — and the eight-year trend

Concern about a major water crisis in their own community: 57% → 71%

What else British Columbians are concerned about (2026)

Issue	Extremely / quite concerned
Private corporations limiting access to lands, forests and water	68%
Water usage by AI data centres for cooling	66%
Water scarcity and droughts due to increasing demand for water by industry	61%
Fast-tracking of major new resource projects (mines, fracking, data centres) increasing demand on fresh water	61%
Loss of food crops due to water scarcity	58%
Water scarcity and droughts due to changing climate	57%

Direction and enforcement. Asked which statement is closer to their view, 60% say “demand on fresh water is going to increase faster than supply; BC needs to do what it takes to secure its fresh water sources,” against 28% who say “BC has plenty of fresh water; we do not need to increase public spending during tough economic times” (13% unsure).

Asked to rate the BC government’s enforcement of laws protecting fresh water from industrial polluters, 42% say “not tough enough,” 31% “about right,” 4% “too tough,” 22% unsure.

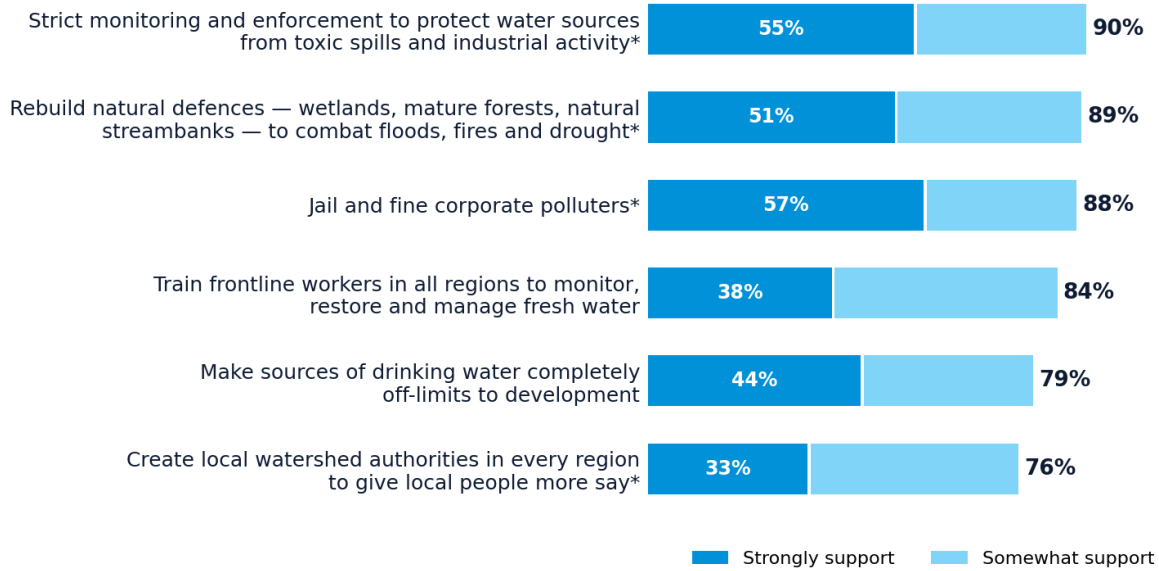

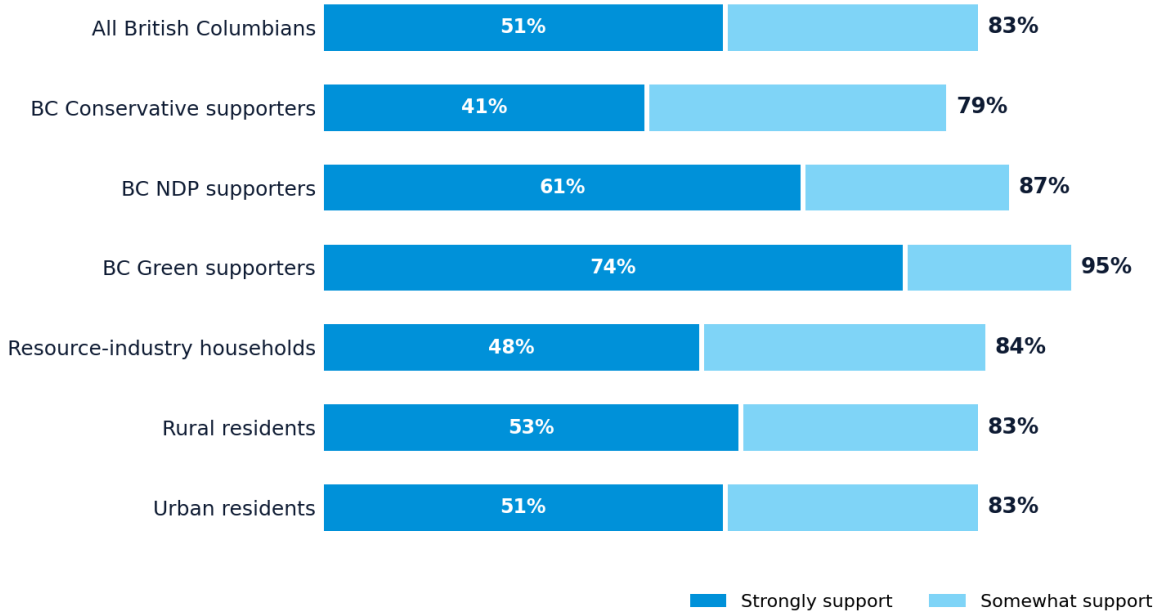

% support, after being shown BC's rate (up to \$2.25 per million litres) against Quebec's (up to \$159)



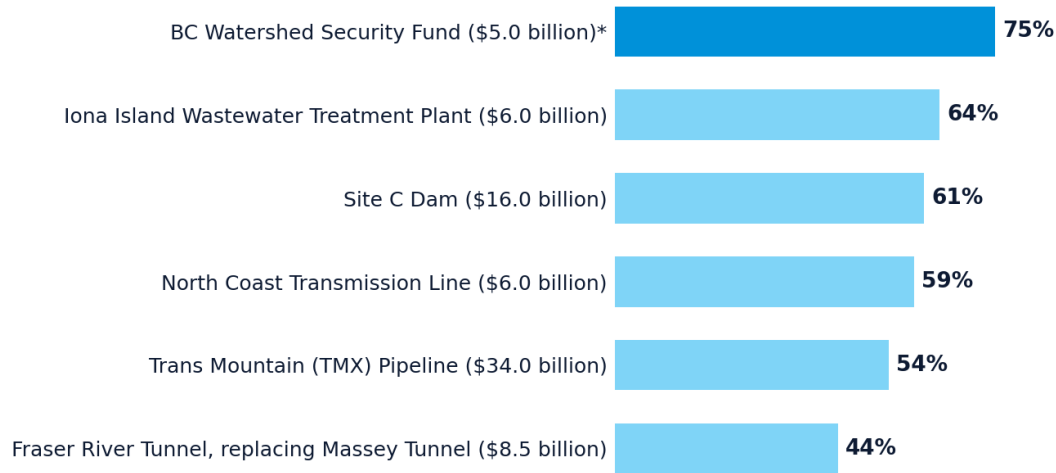

QUESTION: Today, BC charges large industrial users (e.g. a mine) less than \$2.25 for the use of ONE MILLION litres of water, one of the lowest rates in Canada. At the other end of the scale, Quebec charges up to \$159.00 per million litres for industrial users. Would you SUPPORT or OPPOSE raising the water rates for BC's largest industrial water users to pay for fresh water protection?

Survey Tracking

In 2026 the Fund leads at \$5 billion (75%).

In 2024 this question described the Watershed Security Fund as \$2 billion; the Fund was first again (62%).

In 2021 the same exercise at \$1 billion also placed the Fund first (65%) on the list.

9. Methodology

Provincial online survey of n=2,005 British Columbia adults (18+), fielded August 27 to September 1, 2026, in English. Mixed mode: multiple professional online research panels plus social-media recruitment. Regions outside Metro Vancouver were oversampled to support regional analysis. Responses were screened for speeding, straight-lining, failed attention checks, gibberish and AI-generated open-ends. Results are weighted to the Census by rim (rake) weighting on region, gender, age and education, with regions built from Statistics Canada economic regions. Percentages are of valid (non-missing) responses. Items marked * were asked of random half-samples of roughly 1,000. Online panel and social-recruitment samples are not probability samples; the intervals below are Bayesian credible intervals used as the margin-of-error analogue. Design and analysis: McAllister Opinion Research (member, ESOMAR and AAPOR).
